Dogs show skills at agility trials

Exercising with your pet can be rewarding for both dog and owner. The Fieldhouse, best known for health and fitness, is capitalizing on this concept by hosting a dog agility trial competition this weekend. More than 100 dogs and 80 handlers and their families are in Zanesville for the event, which runs through Sunday.

The North American Dog Agility Council (NADAC) Agility Trial event is put on by the Parkersburg Dog Obedience Club.

"For me, it's to have fun and have a strong bond with Jewels. We work together as a team," she said.

Zaborniak said she got Jewels as a puppy when she was 9 years old. "I wasn't as focused then, but when I looked at the tape of her in puppy class I saw she did well and thought we should try," she explained.

She advises that those just starting out should not assume the dog will just do the various parts of the course. "You have to stay with your dog so she doesn't get hurt or anything."

Advice and training ran as rampant as the dogs through the course on Saturday. As Alexis and Jewels left the ring, Mark Paskawych said, "Use random treats while training."

"The treats keep the nose up and more alert to the handler," he said.

It was obvious that whatever these dog owners are doing, the dogs seem to love it. "We can tell they enjoy it by their excitement and enthusiasm," said Paskawych, who is

participating in the event with this wife, Maggie, and their three shelties.

Mark advises, "If you have a dog that's not excited, find a dog that is because they should enjoy it and want to participate."

Deborah Richards, of Hopewell agrees. "It's a game to them. Doing agility is all the things they like to do and it is very reward-oriented," she said.

"It's such an ego booster for the dogs and they get a special bond with their owners," said Linda Roush of Zanesville.

"They're like kids. They all have their own personality," said Richards. "They all have their moments."

Glenn Rawsy and Rebecca Smith of Vienna, W.Va., say their dogs are less troublemakers at home when they have an outlet. The couple started out, like many dog owners, in obedience classes and then found agility.

"Once you do it, you're hooked," said Rawsy. He and his wife have been involved in the sport for about 8 years. "It's one of the fastest growing dog sports in the world," he said.

Dogs of all breed and handlers of all ages participate in the agility events according to Rawsy.

"She ran really well," said Glenn to Rebecca as Kiska, their 12-year-old American Eskimo finished the course.

"This is an awesome sport to connect with your dog," Rebecca said. "It's a great way to bond."

The Fieldhouse has hosted five such events and have more scheduled in the coming year. "We started doing this to help the community," explained Alainna Amicone, director of marketing. "The visitors stay in our community's hotels and eat at our restaurants, so it's a win-win for everyone."

"We love this venue," said Paskawych. "It's got a great central location and the facility is perfect."

"We live for fitness and they live to keep their dogs healthy, so it's a perfect fit," Amicone said.

"We hope people will get interested in doing things with their dogs and not just have them chained up," said Roush. "Since dogs have become domesticated they look to us for everything. When we nurture that, they just want to please us even more."
